Common Date for Easter

Will Catholics and Orthodox Settle on a Common Easter Date?

The Hope for Ecumenical Unity Includes the Desire for a Reconciliation of the Gregorian and Julian Calendar



In an ongoing dialogue with Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew of Constantinople, the successor of St. Andrew the Apostle and "first among equals" among the bishops of the Eastern Orthodox Church, Pope Francis has expressed his belief that Catholics and Orthodox will one day attain full communion. Eastern Orthodox — as opposed to Eastern-rite Catholics who differ from Latin-rite Catholics in custom and liturgical practices but accept the primacy of jurisdiction of the Bishop of Rome — gradually separated from Rome in the Middle Ages and are today composed of a variety of Orthodox churches, the largest of which is the Russian Orthodox Church with nearly 100 million members. Orthodox and Catholics both accept the first seven Ecumenical Councils of the Church as well as the seven sacraments and apostolic succession, but differ in key areas as well, most notably the primacy of the pope.

The 1,700-Year Quest for a Common Easter

COMMENTARY: The Council of Nicaea gave Christianity more than a creed — it gave the Church a way to calculate Easter. But unity around the great feast of the Resurrection remains incomplete.



This year's 1,700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea is suitably marked by both the Catholic and Orthodox Easter falling on the same date, which is not the norm. It was at Nicaea that the date of Easter was set; it was one of the most important items on the conciliar agenda.

The anniversary and the joint celebration this year have fostered hopes that a permanent joint celebration of Easter might be possible. That remains unlikely, however, given that relations within the Orthodox world do not permit such a momentous decision to be made.

The Pope also highlighted the recent participation of Orthodox representatives in October's Synod on Synodality.



Pope Francis has proposed celebrating the 1,700th anniversary of the First Council of Nicaea together with Orthodox leaders, in a personal letter to Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew of Constantinople.

The letter, published by the Vatican on Saturday [Nov. 30, 2024], was delivered by Cardinal Kurt Koch — who heads the Dicastery for Promoting Christian Unity — during a visit to Istanbul for the patronal feast of the Orthodox Church.

"The now imminent 1700th anniversary of the First Ecumenical Council of Nicaea will be another opportunity to bear witness to the growing communion that already exists among all who are baptized in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit," Francis wrote in his message dated Nov. 30.

Bishops of the Standing Conference of Oriental Orthodox Churches Meet with the Assembly of Canonical Orthodox Bishops of the United States

On Friday, April 25, 2025, the Bishops of the Standing Conference of Oriental Orthodox Churches (SCOOCh) vened with their counterparts in the Assembly of Canonical Orthodox Bishops of the United States for a private meeting at the St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church and National Shrine.

At the meeting, the assembled hierarchs discussed practical steps towards unity and collaboration in the fields of theological education, youth ministry, pastoral care, and other areas.







Ecumenism in the Holy Land

Easter celebrations in the Holy Land amid hardship and hope



Christians in the Holy Land are preparing for the Easter celebrations with a mixture of anguish, frustration and hope for peace with talks of a new possible ceasefire to release ten Israeli hostages.

For the second running year Christians in the Holy Land will celebrate Easter amid ongoing violence and conflict along with increasing restrictions on their freedom of movement.

Permits granted to Christians in the West Bank

During the Easter period, Israeli authorities normally grant special permits to allow Palestinian Christians in the West Bank to visit Jerusalem.

According to a statement published by the Israeli Embassy to the Holy See, citing official data from the Israeli Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the competent authorities, this year 9,770 * Christians have obtained permission to enter Jerusalem during the Holy Week, on a total of over 50,000 living in the West Bank who would like to celebrate their faith in the Holy Sites in this crucial religious period. It should be noted, that Christians have never been involved in incidents of violence.

Ancient Roots: The Council of Nicaea, 325 AD

The First Ecumenical Council was held in Nicaea in 325 AD. Among its most important decisions was the establishment of the Nicene Creed and the condemnation of the Arian heresy—Arius being a priest from Alexandria who questioned the divinity of Christ. Another significant decision of the Council was to unify the date of Easter. The Council determined that Easter would fall on the first Sunday after the first full moon following the spring equinox, which occurs after March 21. This means that Easter can be celebrated as early as March 22 or as late as April 25.

This year, 2025, marks the 1700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea, and a "Unified Easter" will be celebrated in Jerusalem on April 20. The convergence of the Julian and Gregorian calendars this year is a "mathematical" coincidence. In fact, the rule is the same for all churches, as mentioned: Easter falls on the first Sunday after the spring full moon following March 21. What causes the current disagreement among churches is their adherence to different civil calendars. Western churches follow the Gregorian calendar (named after Pope Gregory XIII, who reformed the calendar in 1582), while Eastern churches continue to follow the Julian calendar (named after the pagan Emperor Julius Caesar, who implemented it in 46 BC). There is a 13-day difference between the two calendars. So when March 21 arrives in the Gregorian calendar, the Julian calendar must wait 13 more days for its own March 21. This discrepancy can result in a difference of a week or more, and up to a maximum of five weeks. Thus, the disagreement stems from the use of two different civil calendars, not from differing ecclesiastical calculations. Occasionally, March 21 and the spring full moon fall on the same day in both calendars, making Easter coincide in all churches—as is the case this year.

Pope Francis' desire to foster unity among Christian Churches

Throughout his twelve years as head of the Catholic Church, Pope Francis' push for a greater sense of unity between all Christian Churches was evident through his words and deeds.



Rifts between the different Christian Churches date back centuries. But rather than give in to unprecedent, healthy Pope Francis used his time in the papacy to build upon the ecufoundation menical of his predecessors to bridge the gap.

From introducing himself as Bishop of



Rome rather than Pope upon his election to becoming the first Pope to make a visit with Anglican and Reformed leaders, Pope Francis repeatedly expressed his solidarity with different Churches through his words and actions over the last twelve years.

Pope Francis seen as strong promoter of Eastern Catholic traditions, liturgy, mission



Eastern Catholic leaders are remembering Pope Francis for bringing significant attention to their churches and traditions throughout his papacy, in a legacy marked by fraternity and many firsts, while marked with some tensions at times.

The pope, who died April 21 at age 88 after a 12-year pontificate, was "a fan of the East," said Ines A. Murzaku, professor of ecclesiastical history and founding chair of the Department of Catholic Studies at Seton Hall University.

That affection traced its roots to the pope's native Argentina, where, as Cardinal Jorge Mario Bergoglio, he was the ordinary for Eastern-rite faithful, who at the time had no bishop of their own in that nation.

Murzaku told OSV News that Pope Francis called for Catholics in the Latin Church "to turn East and learn," particularly by starting with Eastern Catholic churches "in their own backyard."

"Not many Westerners know of the Catholic East — and that these churches are as Catholic as the Western Churches," said Murzaku.

Churches of the Middle East

'Brother in humanity': Church leaders in Middle East pay tribute to Pope Francis

On Monday morning, April 21, the Christian world was shaken by the passing of Pope Francis at the age of 88. His death marked the end of a life of faith and service that spanned decades, culminating in 12 years of humble service as the Roman pontiff.

In the midst of the Easter season — a time Francis long proclaimed as a message of hope — churches across the Middle East are bidding the pope farewell with liturgies and prayer, while Arab leaders are paying tribute to him with messages of respect and appreciation.

Patriarch Ignatius Joseph III Younan of the Syriac Catholic Church offered prayers on behalf of the synod, clergy, and faithful for the repose of Pope Francis' soul, asking the Lord to reward him with the inheritance of the kingdom for his pastoral service and profound acts of charity. The patriarch presided over a special Easter Monday Mass for his repose and invited bishops and priests to commemorate the pope in the Eucharistic celebrations.

Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church

"Today I am travelling from Kyiv to Rome to lead a delegation of our Church's bishops at the funeral of St. Francis on Saturday." "And then, with God's help, I will take part in the enthronement of the new, newly-elected Pope" - Head of the Ecumenical Catholic Church," noted.

On April 23, 2025 Father and Head of the UGCC Blessed Svyatoslav led the Divine Liturgy on the occasion of the consecration of the renovated Church of St. George in the city of Drohobych. At the end of the Liturgy, he addressed the faithful to pray for the late Pope Francis and for the Cardinals who will soon gather at the conclave to elect a new Pope.

Syro-Malankara Catholic Church

The first Pope of the Americas Jorge Mario Bergoglio hails from Argentina. The 76-year-old Jesuit Archbishop of Buenos Aires is a prominent figure throughout the continent, yet remains a simple pastor who is deeply loved by his diocese, throughout which he has travelled extensively on the underground and by bus during the 15 years of his episcopal ministry.

"My people are poor and I am one of them", he has said more than once, explaining his decision to live in an apartment and cook his own supper. He has always advised his priests to show mercy and apostolic courage and to keep their doors open to everyone. The worst thing that could happen to the Church, he has said on various occasions, "is what de Lubac called spiritual worldliness", which means, "being self-centred". And when he speaks of social justice, he calls people first of all to pick up the Catechism, to rediscover the Ten Commandments and the Beatitudes. His project is simple: if you follow Christ, you understand that "trampling upon a person's dignity is a serious sin".
